The influenza epidemic in Trentham Military Camp made an impact in the Upper Hutt community. In this document I have researched and recorded some details about the individual people who died of influenza and were associated with the Upper Hutt district in one way or another.

<u>First two influenza deaths</u> associated with Upper Hutt district were: 03 Sep 1918 - Pte Linus Bernard Golder - died aboard "Tahiti" buried at sea mother UH 04 Sep 1918 - Pte Thomas James Stanley - died aboard "Tahiti" buried at sea wife UH

"There have been twelve deaths recorded in the district (including the three at the Upper Hutt emergency hospital) five in the country and seven in the township and of these three were soldiers, four soldiers wives, one a soldiers child, and two had soldier lodgers, only two were unassociated with soldiers or camp".

Alfred's daughter Gertrude E Avery attended Upper Hutt School from 27 May 1918 to 08 November 1918 when the school was closed due to the influenza epidemic.

Blacksmith – Farm Hand - Soldier

(Pte Robert Daniel Benge 74285 - 10 November 1918)

Robert Daniel Benge was born 06 June 1897 in Upper Hutt to parents Matilda Jane nee Hooper and Samuel William Benge who were married in 1894.

Robert attended Upper Hutt School from 1900 to 1903, Mungaroa School (formerly Te Marua later renamed Brown Owl) from 16 February 1903 to 14 February 1911. Robert's father Samuel William Benge died 29 December 1907 and was buried at Akatarawa cemetery in Upper Hutt.

Robert left school in 1911 and became a blacksmith, farm hand and farm manager.

"Called to Camp – Thirty-two appeals heard - On behalf of Private Robert Daniel Benge D Company 38th Reinforcements, Mr Barton asked for a rehearing of the recruits appeal for exemption. The appellant stated that he was manager of his mother's dairy farm Kaitoke. His elder brother has been helping but the later eldest son since the previous hearing had had his leg amputated owing to a gun accident so that he could not now help as much on the farm as he used to. The board decided to recommend leave till May 28".

Robert Daniel Benge married Annie Agnes nee Osborne on 28 June 1918 at Te Marua Upper Hutt. Annie was born 17 April 1898 in New Zealand to parents Augutsa nee Haizo and Samuel Osborne.

Private Robert Daniel Benge 74285 was training at Featherston Military Camp when he was admitted to the military hospital with influenza and died at 6.30am on 10 November 1918. Robert was buried at Featherston cemetery in Wairarapa.

John Brown was born 27 March 1887 in New Zealand to parents Janet nee Little and John Brown who were married 1886 in New Zealand. John siblings were William born 1889, Hugh (1890-1951), David Lindsay Adams (1892-1917), Mary born 1895, Arthur Ernest (1897-1968) and Robert Little (1901-1966).

John Brown occupation platelayer address Railway Cottage was recorded on the 1911 Hutt Electoral Roll. John Brown junior worked as a shunter for the New Zealand Railways.

John Brown married 1916 in New Zealand to Mildred May nee Hurle who was born 1897 in New Zealand to parents Edith Maud nee Johnson and Henry Isaac William Hurle.

John's brother Gunner Lindsay Brown 10564 NZ Field Artillery died of wounds 11 October 1917 in France while serving overseas in World War One. Lindsay left a widow Ivy Leonora nee Nelson who he married 28 October 1915 in Palmerston North and their son William Harold Brown born 24 April 1916 in Palmerston North.

John Brown died from influenza on 12 November 1918 in Upper Hutt. He was buried at St John's Anglican churchyard Trentham Upper Hutt.

"Epidemic at Upper Hutt – Work of the relief committee – Just about the time the armistice was announced the epidemic put in an appearance on armistice night the victim being a railway shunter".

John Brown the railway shunter was not a descendant of the early Upper Hutt settler James Brown.

John Thomas Craig - husband (did not die of influenza)

(Mary Philomenia Craig nee Cudby – 22 November 1918)

John Thomas Craig was born 25 September 1866 in Upper Hutt to his widowed mother Elizabeth Anne nee Hodgson and his late father John Craig.

"Obituary - Elizabeth Kelly - On Sunday last [1912] at 3.30 am there passed away at Upper Hutt Mrs Elizabeth Kelly at the age of 72 years. The deceased lady was born at Durham England on 05 June 1840 and came out to New Zealand on the first trip of the "Oliver Lang" in 1855 with her father, Mr Henry Hodgson, her mother and her brother - she herself being 15 years of age at the time. It may be here mentioned that the second trip of the "Oliver Lang" ended in her going ashore at Kaiwharawhara in a sou'easter of similar violence to that of Saturday last. Shortly after their arrival the Hodgson family settled at Trentham where Mr Hodgson who was a blacksmith by trade established the first smithy at Trentham close to where the Trentham [Quinn's Post] Hotel now stands. He continued in business for several years until his death when he was buried at St John's Trentham. His widow and her daughter (the late Mrs Kelly) lived together for a number of years until the former died and was laid to rest alongside her husband. In 1863 Miss Hodgson was married to John Craig of Wellington by whom she had issue a son John T. Craig who married Mary fifth daughter of Charles Cudby, and a daughter Mary who married William second son of the late Alexander Martin senior. Some three or four years after his marriage Mr Craig went to the Otago Goldfields with his wife's brother (Mr Hodgson) [step-brother Thomas Skinner]. In 1867 [1866] the two mates left the diggings for Dunedin and were caught in a violent snowstorm and were missing for some time. When the bodies were discovered it was found the two men had camped out and perished in the snow. Their remains were interred in Otago. Mrs Craig and her children lived with her parents until 1869 when she married the late John Kelly a steady industrious man employed by the Barton family. Mr Kelly saved sufficient money to purchase fifty acres of land extending from the main road to the Hutt River, on which he and his wife carried on dairy operations until his death. Mr Kelly fell heavily on a big tree he was passing over at Akatarawa sustaining serious injuries to his side. A few months later in 1883 he succumbed and was buried at St Joseph's Upper Hutt. Mrs Kelly continued to work the farm until 1892 when she rented it to her son Mr J T Craig and retired into private life. The holding is valued at £4,800. Mrs Kelly and her two cronies who have predeceased her, Mrs G Brown senior and Mrs Greenwood senior, were familiar figures in the central portion of the township. During the influenza epidemic a newspaper report regarding the Upper Hutt emergency hospital reads "On 22 November Craig and Potts from Upper Hutt, and Ted Cottle from Heretaunga, were brought in - all bad cases".

Another newspaper article reads "*Deaths – Craig – On Friday 22nd November 1918 at her late residence Main Road Upper Hutt Mary Philomena Craig beloved wife of John Craig aged 46 years R.I.P.*" Mary was buried at St Joseph's churchyard in Upper Hutt.

The confusion was solved when part of a later newspaper article recorded "Jack Craig [and others] re-joined their families at Upper Hutt". The date would have been Saturday 14 December when the emergency hospital was officially closed.

John Thomas Craig was also known as Jack was admitted to the emergency hospital on the 22 November the same day his beloved wife died of influenza at their residence Main Road Upper Hutt.

John was now a widower with 8 children John Archibald aged 22, Rita Elizabeth age 21, Augustus Henry age 19, Constance Mary age 18, Reginald Charles age 17, Edna Frances age 9 years, Clare Philomena age 7 years and the youngest Raymond Joseph age 2 years old. Two daughters Rita and Clare never married so I believe they both looked after the younger children and the household for their father.

John Thomas Craig died 01 February 1933 in Upper Hutt and he was buried with his late wife Mary Philomena at St Joseph's churchyard in Upper Hutt. Many years later the headstones in the churchyard were removed when the old church was demolished and new church built on the same site. The names of those buried in the churchyard are recorded on the back wall of the church.

They had 2 older siblings Maurice Henry born 22 October 1913 and Mary Patricia born 07 July 1916 both at Renwicktown Blenheim. Their parents were Ellenore nee Forbes and Henry John Flanagan who married on 26 December 1892 in Renwicktown Blenheim.

The twin's father Private Henry John Flanagan service number 657 enlisted and was serving at Trentham Military Camp when the influenza epidemic made its appearance. The family were residing at Trentham and later in Williams Street Upper Hutt.

One of the first five influenza patients admitted to the Upper Hutt temporary emergency hospital when it opened on Monday 18 November 1918 was the twins mother Mrs Ellenore Flanagan.

The twins were un-weaned so they had to accompany their mother to the hospital. On the same day Mr Angus John McCurdy visited the hospital and seeing that the twins required some attention he comforted them until they stopped crying. <u>Hec Benge</u> and <u>Bernie Judd</u> arrived and

Angus McCurdy handed them a baby each while he went away to fetch some milk from John Larmer who refused to take payment for the milk.

On 22 November 1918 the twins' older brother Maurice was admitted to the hospital from the Maymorn district. It is not known who was looking after him in Maymorn.

The following day on the 23 the twins' older sister Mary was admitted to hospital from the Heretaunga district. It is not known who was looking after her in Heretaunga.

Later the twins father Henry John Flanagan was admitted to the hospital with influenza but the date of his admission is unknown

The twins' family were by now all patients in the hospital. At some time the twins were placed in the care of Mrs Philip David Davis (Emily Alice nee Judd) but the date is unknown. The Upper Hutt community got involved and supported each other during the epidemic.

On Wednesday 27 November 1918 the twins' brother and their father were discharged from the hospital and they returned to their cottage. Their neighbour Mrs Shaw looked in on them until relatives arrived to take care of them.

Mrs Flanagan and her daughter remained in the hospital but were eventually discharged but the date is unknown. The hospital closed on 14 December 1918.

The only members the Flanagan family who did not get influenza appears to be the twin's Monica and Kathleen Flanagan

#### The twin's uncle John

The twins' uncle John Flanagan was serving at the Trentham Military Camp at the same time as the twins father Henry Flanagan.

The twins uncle John Flanagan was aged 40 years old when he died of influenza followed by pneumonia 11 am on 15 November 1918 at the Trentham Military Hospital. His death notice recorded next of kin as m (mother) Mrs H Flanagan Wallaceville. It should have read b (brother) Mr H (Henry) Flanagan of Wallaceville, who of course was the twins' father.

John Flanagan was buried 18 November 1918 soldiers section Karori cemetery Wellington.

### Mrs Jane Golder nee Martin – mother and mother-in-law

(Private Linus Bernard Golder 579138 - 03 September 1918)

(Ruby Vallance Golder - 11 November 1918 and Mary Elizabeth Golder - 17 November 1918)

The first two influenza deaths associated with the Upper Hutt district was aboard the ship HMNZT "*Tahiti*". The ship departed New Zealand on 10 July 1918, and joined a military convoy in Freetown, Sierra Leone in West Africa where influenza was making its appearance. The "*Tahiti*" departed Freetown on 26 August and on the same day the first influenza case was admitted to the ship's hospital. On Tuesday 03 September 1918 Private Linus Bernard Golder 79138 died of influenza and was buried at sea.

Jane Golder nee Martin a widow along with her family resided Main Road Upper Hutt in the cottage that her late husband John Golder built. They had 12 children [1] Alexander William born 1878 [2] John Anthony born 1879 [3] Francis Joseph born 1881 [4] William Martin born 1883 [5] Mary Elizabeth born 1885 [6] Bertram James born 1887 [7] Thomas Charles born 1889 [8] Agnes Jane born 1891 [9] Teresa Isabella born 1893 [10] Ellen Aloysius born 1896 [11] Linus Bernard Golder born 1898 [12] Vincent Augustus born 1899 all born in Upper Hutt.

Jane's oldest son Rifleman Alexander William Golder 51519 enlisted 28 Feb 1917 and served overseas in World War One. Towards the end of the war Jane's younger son Private Linus Bernard Golder 79138 enlisted 01 May 1918 and departed New Zealand on the 10 July 1918 on the ship "Tahiti".

On the night of 03 September 1918 Linus died of influenza and was buried at sea on 04th November. Linus was born, educated, worked and resided in Upper Hutt with his mother Jane and his siblings. This was the first influenza death associated with the Upper Hutt district.

Jane's son Francis Joseph Golder and his wife Ruby Vallance nee Wills reside in Taihape with their two sons Francis Noel Beaumont Golder and John Gerald Golder.

Jane's daughter Mary Elizabeth Golder went to live with her brother to help look after his two sons as their mother was unwell.

On the 11 November 1918 Jane's daughter-in-law Ruby Vallance Golder nee Wills died of influenza in Taihape.

Jane's daughter-in-law Ruby Vallance Golder age 30 was buried on 13 November 1918 Catholic section block 1 plot 33 row C2 area east at Taihape cemetery by Father Kirkhead. The headstone reads "*In loving memory of Ruby Vallance the beloved wife of Francis Joseph Golder died 11th November 1918 aged 30 years R.I.P.*"

On 17 November 1918 Jane's daughter Mary Elizabeth Golder died of influenza in Taihape.

Mr F Golder of the local railway staff lost both his wife and sister and previously lost a brother who succumbed to the epidemic on board a New Zealand transport".

Francis Joseph Golder took his two sons Francis Noel Beaumont Golder age 5 year and John Gerald Golder age 7 months to Upper Hutt and left them with his younger sister Teresa and mother Jane to bring up.

Jane's oldest son Alexander returned home safely after the war. The war with its great loss of lives caused only a small impact on Jane. The great loss for Jane Golder was the death of her son Linus, daughter-in-law Ruby and daughter Mary from the influenza epidemic.

Jane died 1942 and was buried with her husband John Golder at St Joseph's churchyard in Upper Hutt.

Charles James was born 20 April 1888 in Redruth Cornwall England. His parents were Mr P and Isabella James.

Charles departed England and settled in New Zealand. When World War One began he enlisted and departed for overseas duty on 17 April 1915 with the Canterbury Infantry Regiment.

While serving overseas Charles Bettie James met and married Lottie nee Rich on 08 December 1917 in Taunton Somerset England.

Lottie accompanied her husband Charles when he returned to New Zealand in March 1918. When Charles was stationed at Trentham Military Camp, Lottie resided in Heretaunga which was part of the Hutt County in the Upper Hutt district. When Charles was transferred to the Featherston Military Camp, Lottie remained in Heretaunga.

Norman Denford Jones met and married Amy Josephine nee Lawrence on 14 January 1914 in Waitara New Zealand by the minister Rev Griffin.

When the war began Norman enlisted and served in New Zealand. Later his wife Amy Josephine joined him in Trentham Upper Hutt.

Norman was admitted to the Trentham Military Hospital on 17 October with influenza and was discharged on 22 October 1918. He spent 6 days in hospital then on the 06 November he was admitted again with influenza and spent another 14 days in hospital.

Norman's was in hospital when his wife Amy Josephine Jones age 27 died of influenza on 18 November 1918. Norman was discharged from the Military hospital the following day on 19 November 1918.

Amy Josephine Jones was buried at St John's churchyard in Trentham Upper Hutt.

When Norman was demobilised he returned to farm in the Taranaki area. Norman Denford Jones married Lily / Lillian Pennington in 1921. William Leonard Earnest Jones was born 03 October 1917 and died 1993 and on his birth registration it recorded parents as Lilian and Norman Denford Jones.

Norman Denford Jones died on the 04 October 1969 in Taranaki.

Donald John McKenzie was a fencer employed by Reid & Sommerville in Upper Hutt.

Hilda Josephine McGhie met Donald John McKenzie and they married on 15 September 1915 in Upper Hutt.

The couples' first born was a daughter Hilda Doreen McKenzie who was born 11 August 1916 in the Wellington region.

Sergeant Donald John McKenzie 56003 enlisted and was serving at Trentham Military Camp when the influenza epidemic made its appearance.

Hilda and Donald's daughter Hilda Doreen McKenzie was 2 years old when she died on 17 November 1918 in Upper Hutt. Hilda was buried the following day at St John's churchyard in Trentham Upper Hutt.

Newspaper articles state that one child died in Upper Hutt during the influenza epidemic but did not record the child's name. To prove the cause of died was influenza requires the sighting of the death registration for Hilda Doreen McKenzie. Hilda was the only child that I could locate who died during the influenza epidemic in Upper Hutt so I believe she was the child mentioned in the newspaper article.

Margaret, Aileen & Valentine McTigue - children (Sergeant Major Edward John McTigue 18 November 1918) Aileen, Valentine and Margaret McTigue were the children of Julia Bridget nee McEvedy and Edward John McTigue. The children had another sibling Francis Anthony McTigue who was born 1910 and died the same year.

At the beginning of World War One the children and their parents departed the South Island and settled at Main Road Upper Hutt. The children's father was Staff Sergeant Major McTigue and he was an instructor at Trentham Military Camp.

Aileen/Eileen and Valentine McTigue were admitted to Upper Hutt School on 16 August 1915 and Margaret on 30 July 1917. Some of their fellow students who father's serving overseas would have to wait to the end of the war before seeing their fathers again. The McTigue children could see their father most days.

The Upper Hutt School was closed from November 1918 to 04 February 1919. Upper Hutt School became an emergency hospital during the influenza epidemic. The hospital opened on 18 November and closed on 14 December 1918. Unknown to Margaret, Aileen and Valentine was that they would never return to Upper Hutt School.

The children's father Sergeant Major Edward John McTigue was admitted to the Trentham Military Camp hospital on 17 November and died of influenza the following day on 18 November 1918.

"Obituary – A message from Trentham Military Camp announces the death from pneumonia of Sergeant-Major E J (Ned) McTigue son-in-law of Mrs P McEvedy of "Blackwater" Southbridge. He was a splendid specimen of manhood tall and strongly built, and one of the last men one would expect to succumb to an attack of sickness. Sergeant-Major McTigue was for a number of years in the Permanent Artillery at Lyttleton and from there was transferred to Southland. Not long after the outbreak of war he was sent up to Trentham Camp as an instructor and made his home at Upper Hutt".

"Sergeant Major E J McTrigue who died of pneumonia at the Trentham Military Hospital was a brother in law of Dr P F McEvedy of Wellington. He was a splendid specimen of manhood, tall and of fine physique, one of the last men that would be expected to succumb to an attack of sickness. For a number of years Sergeant Major McTrigue was in the Permanent Artillery at Lyttleton and from there was transferred to Southland being stationed at Wyndham and Gore. Not long after the outbreak of war he was sent up to Trentham as an instructor and made his home at Upper Hutt".

The majority of the service personnel who died of influenza at Trentham Military hospital were buried in the soldiers section at Karori cemetery in Wellington.

The children's father was buried in the soldier section area A, block AA, row 03, plot 021, of Karori cemetery in Wellington. The headstone reads, "*Staff Sgt/Major E J MCTIGUE Home Service Section NZEF died 18 November 1918 age 38*".

On 21 November 1918 Jean Murdoch McTigue age 1 years old died. She was the daughter of

The children and their widowed mother departed Upper Hutt and settled in Canterbury near their relatives. The children mother Julia Bridget McTigue died 06 February 1958.

The Memorial Park cemetery in Bromley Christchurch block 2, row 12, plot 401 headstone reads "In loving memory of our dear parents Edward John McTigue died 18 November 1918, Julia Bridget McTigue died 06 February 1958. R.I.P."

During World War One the children may have thought their father was safe serving in New Zealand and not overseas but the influenza epidemic changed everything just like the war did for many other Upper Hutt children.

Ada Edith Potts nee Dalton – wife then widow (Charles Henry Potts – 23 November 1918)

Ada Edith Dalton was born 11 January 1887 to parents Sarah nee Blandford and John Benjamin Dalton. Ada attended Upper Hutt School from 1892 to 1900.

Charles Henry Potts was born 1880 in Cassilis New South Wales Australia. Charles departed Australia and in 1903 arrived in New Zealand. Ada Edith Dalton met and married Charles Henry Potts 1906 in New Zealand.

Charles was a brick-maker employed by the Brick & Tile Company in Silverstream. There was also a Thomas Potts working for the same company. Ada and Charles resided in Silverstream then later moved to King Street in Upper Hutt.

Ada and Charles had 6 children Robert Henry born 08 Dec 1908, Archibald John born 26 Sep 1908, Edward Charles born 03 Nov 1909 (died 1949), Russell William born 26 Sep 1911, Stanley Herbert born 29 September 1913 (died 29 September 1913), Dorothy Ada born 1917 and Charles Clarence Potts born 01 April 1918.

Ada's husband was admitted to the Upper Hutt Emergency hospital with Influenza on the 22 November. He died the following day on 23 November 1918 leaving Ada a young widow with 6 children to support the youngest being just a baby.

"Deaths – Potts – On the 23rd November 1918 at Upper Hutt, Charles Henry dearly beloved husband of Ada Edith Potts in his 36th year - So loved so mourned".

Charles was buried at Wallaceville cemetery in Whiteman's Valley along with his son Stanley Herbert Potts who died in 1913.

During World War One the government provided pensions for the widows of service personnel who died while serving. Due to the influenza epidemic leaving widows with young families the Government began discussing providing a pension for the influenza widows.

Ada remained in King Street with her family. In 1922 Ada married Leslie Galloway Robertson and they settled in Palmerston North.

Ada Edith Robertson ex Potts nee Dalton was age 81 when died on 29 June 1968. She was buried at the Kelvin Grove cemetery in Palmerston North and the headstone reads, "*In Loving memory of Ada Edith Robertson 1887-1968*".

Cause of death unknown perhaps influenza

(Richard Quinn – 23 November 1918)

Richard Quinn born 1869 New Zealand reference RGO NZ birth registration 1869 folio website 1869/10749 parents Anne and Patrick Quinn.

Richard Quinn died 23 November 1918 at his residence in Upper Hutt and was buried at Karori cemetery in Wellington.

The cause of death for Richard is unknown and can only be confirmed by sighting his death registration. I have placed Richard in this document as he died when the influenza epidemic was rife at Trentham Military Camp and in the Upper Hutt district.

"A quiet but forceful and popular personality has been lost in the death of Mr Richard Quinn of Upper Hutt and Trentham, and formerly of Wellington. Mr Quinn, with his mother and family, arrived here from the Westland goldfields, where his father in the early days opened the diggings called after him Quinn's Terrace. Deceased was born at the old goldmining settlement Staffordtown about seven miles from Hokitika, 49 years ago. Until recently he was proprietor of Quinn's Post Hotel, Wallaceville, and during the four years he was in the district, he was a member of the Upper Hutt Town Board, vice-president of the Horticultural Society and the Bowling Club, and a steward of the Petone Trotting Club. He was also a, prominent member of the Catholic community".

Richard's mother Annie Quinn was a resident in Upper Hutt when she died in 3 September 1942 and was buried at Karori cemetery Wellington with her son Richard Quinn.

Mrs Annie Quinn - The death has occurred at the age of 92 of Mrs Annie Quinn, a resident of Upper Hutt; who was well known on the West Coast and in the Wellington district in her connection with the hotel business. The late Mrs Quinn was born in Ireland. She came to New Zealand at the age of 16, her parents being among the West Coast pioneers attracted by the lure of gold. Soon after her arrival she married the late Mr Patrick Quinn, who however, died nearly 50 years ago. After leaving Hokitika Mrs Quinn, associated with members of the family, was connected with the management of various hotels in Wellington. After living in Lyall Bay for 20 years, she retired to Upper Hutt. Daphne and Frank Rickard – children and orphans

(Staff Sergeant George Edward Francis Rickard 61063 - 20 November 1918) (Elsie Irene Rickard - 26 November 1918)

Daphne Irene Carne Rickard born 30 August 1911 and Frank Edward Clifton Rickard born 02 August 1915 were living in Auckland with their parents Elsie Irene nee Pickering and George Edward Francis Rickard who were married on 08 January 1911 in Auckland New Zealand.

Their mother Elsie Irene was born 1894 to parents Annie Muir nee Cornish and Henry Vypond Pickering who married 1891 in New Zealand. Their father George Edward Francis RICKARD was born 13 March 1885 Hokitika to parents Eliza nee Roberts and Francis Henry Rickard who were married 1884 in New Zealand.

Daphne and Frank's father was an accountant for the Defence Department during World War One. Staff Sergeant George Edward Rickard 61063 of Auckland was transferred from Auckland to Army Pay Corps at Trentham Military Camp on 15 July 1917.

The children Daphne and Frank and their parents resided Main Road Heretaunga.

Daphne and Frank's father was buried in the soldiers section of Karori cemetery Wellington solder section area 11, block AA, row 03, plot 007 the headstone reads "61063 S/Sgt G E Rickard Home Service Section NZEF died 20 November 1918 age 34".

"Deaths in Camp - Trentham – 61263 Staff Sergeant George Ed Rickard (Mrs E J Rickard Heretaunga) November 20th".

Around the same time the children's mother Elsie Irene Rickard took ill with influenza. During this time it is believed that Daphne and Frank were cared for by a neighbour Mrs Mullighan Main Road Heretaunga.

On 26 November 1918 in Upper Hutt the children's mother Elsie Irene Rickard died of influenza.

Daphne and Frank's mother was buried at St John's churchyard in Trentham Upper Hutt. The headstone reads "In fond and loving memory of Elsie RICKARD who died at Upper Hutt 26 November 1918 aged 24 - Home at last thy labour done, safe and blest the victory won, Jordon passed from pain set free, Angles now have welcomed thee, peace perfect peace".

The children's parents had been joined in marriage but now upon death they were separated with one buried at Karori cemetery in Wellington and the other at St Johns churchyard in Trentham Upper Hutt.

"A sad occurrence in connection with the epidemic was the death at Trentham Camp of Staff sergeant George E Rickard on Saturday week. Four days later Mrs Rickard died from the same disease leaving two children orphans. Staff Sergeant Richard who was 33 years of age has been on permanent staff at the Auckland Defence Office for four year. He enlisted about 18 months ago but having failed to pass the medical test was transferred to the Army Pay Corps. Deceased was the only son of Mrs E R Rickard formerly postmistress at Ahawa West Coast".

Daphne and Frank left Upper Hutt and went to Auckland where they were cared for by their paternal grandparents Annie Muir and Henry Vypond Pickering. The Defence Department issued a memorial scroll and plaque to the children's grandparents with instructions that when grandson attained the age of 18 that they would hand the memorials to Frank.

Many children lost their fathers while they were serving overseas but still had a mother to care for them. The saddest occurrence was perhaps that the children thought their father was safe serving in New Zealand but died along with their mother and left them orphaned as a result of the influenza epidemic.

Four clever medical men three of them New Zealanders born and bred and all of them "white men" in the best sense of the term have since last week gone under while doing their level best to rescue suffering humanity from the prevailing epidemic. Major John V Sale M.C. (one of the medical staff at Trentham Camp) was the son of Professor Sale beloved by old students of Otago University. In this case the old saying "like father like son" applies. Both were brilliant men. Dr Sale whose practice before the war was at Invercargill leaves a widow and two children in the southern town to morn their loss.

Major John Bonwell Sale 3/4316 was buried solders section of Karori cemetery in Wellington.

John's widow Lavender Gladys Irene Sale nee Cross return to Invercargill where she died in 1969.

Mrs Annie Louisa Stanley nee Banks – teacher and soldier's wife (Private Thomas James Stanley 12/4094 - 04 September 1918)

Around 1911 widow Maria Louisa Banks and her adult children Annie Louisa, May Maud and Henry Dunbar were all residing in the Upper Hutt district. The same year Miss (Annie) Banks took up the position of head mistress at Mungaroa School later known as Te Marua School.

Annie's mother Maria Louisa died at their Upper Hutt residence on 29 February 1912 and was buried at Karori cemetery Wellington with her late husband William Dunbar Banks.

In 1912 Annie was still teaching at Te Marua School and her brother Henry also known as Harry Banks was the sole teacher at Karapoti School from 1912 to 1915.

When World War One began Henry was given leave of absence from the Education board and enlisted at Trentham on 22 August 1916 where he served overseas as Lieutenant in the Wellington Regiment.

Thomas James Stanley a widower and discharged soldier who previously served overseas and was invalided home as "*no longer fit for active service*". Thomas took his discharge in Trentham Military Camp and while in the Upper Hutt district he met Annie Louisa Banks.

Annie Louisa Banks and Thomas James Stanley both travelled to Auckland where they married on 14 January 1918 in the presence of both their families. Annie's older siblings were resident in Auckland and Thomas children from his previous marriage also resident in Auckland.

After the marriage Thomas and his new bride Mrs Annie Louisa Stanley returned to Upper Hutt where Annie continued teaching at Te Marua School. Thomas's daughter Alice attended Te Marua School where her step-mother was teaching.

Annie's husband Thomas had recovered his strength so on 16 April 1918 he re-enlisted. He recorded his next of kin as wife Mrs Annie Louisa Stanley Upper Hutt. Thomas embarked on 10 July 1918 for overseas duty on the ship "*Tahiti*".

The first two influenza deaths associated with the Upper Hutt district was aboard the ship HMNZT "*Tahiti*". The ship departed New Zealand on 10 July 1918, and joined a military convoy in Freetown, Sierra Leon where influenza was making its appearance. The "*Tahiti*" departed

Freetown on 26 August and on the same day the first influenza case was admitted to the ship's hospital.

On Wednesday 04 September 1918 Private Thomas James Stanley 12/4094 died on influenza aboard the ship "Tahiti. Thomas was buried at sea.

Two months later on 04 November 1918 Annie's brother Henry Dunbar Banks the former teacher at Karapoti School was killed in action in France.

In 1919 Annie was still resident in Upper Hutt and head teacher at Te Marua School.

Annie married at St David's Church in Auckland on 27 December 1924 to Charles Fortescue Brown. Annie Louisa Brown ex Stanley nee Banks aged 88 died 1960 in Auckland.
