Origin of Street names in the 1907 Waldegrave Park Estate subdivision

Elm Street

Elm Street was named after the Elm tree. The Waldegrave Park Estate subdivision's theme was trees perhaps taken from the fact that most of the streets started at Pine Avenue. The 1910 Waldegrave Park Estate plan and correspondence recorded Oak, Elm, Hazel, Pine, McParland streets Willow & Poplar grove (plus Park Street which was renamed Kowhai Street). They have just obtained authority to lay out some new streets and have named them, Willow Grove, Poplar Grove, Hazel Street, Elm Street, Oak Street and Park Street reference Papers past website Timaru Herald newspaper 06 October 1908 page 4. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded Elm Street.

Hazel Street

Hazel Street was named after the Hazel tree. The Waldegrave Park Estate subdivision's theme was trees perhaps taken from the fact that most of the streets began at Pine Avenue. The 1910 Waldegrave Park Estate plan and correspondence recorded Oak, Elm, Hazel, Pine, McParland streets Willow & Poplar grove (plus Park Street which was renamed Kowhai Street). They have just obtained authority to lay out some new streets and have named them, Willow Grove, Poplar Grove, Hazel Street, Elm Street, Oak Street and Park Street reference Papers past website Timaru Herald newspaper 06 October 1908 page 4. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded Hazel Street.

Hutt Main Road

Hutt Main Road was already established and was also recorded on the 1908 plan of the Upper Hutt Township Estate. The business section of the Road was renamed Main Street but the remainder is now known as Fergusson Drive.

McParland Street

McParland Street was named after Francis McParland. Francis was a Wellington hotel keeper, landowner (also owned block 80 UH) and developer of the Waldegrave Park Estate subdivision. The Waldegrave Park Estate 1910 plan records Oak, Elm, Hazel, Pine, McParland streets and Willow & Poplar grove (plus Park street which was renamed Kowhai street). McParland Street was already established but appeared on the 1908 plan of the "Upper Hutt Township Estate" In the middle of the McParland street between Gibbons Street & Royal Street this section was originally known as Alexandra Street. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded McParland Street. A later extension near McParland Street caused Alexandra Street to be renamed and absorbed into McParland Street.

Oak Street

Oak Street was named after the Oak tree. The Waldegrave Park Estate subdivision's theme was trees perhaps taken from the fact that most of the streets started at Pine Avenue. The 1910 Waldegrave Park Estate plan and correspondence recorded Oak, Elm, Hazel, Pine, McParland streets Willow & Poplar grove (plus Park Street which was renamed Kowhai Street). They have just obtained authority to lay out some new streets and have named them, Willow Grove, Poplar Grove, Hazel Street, Elm Street, Oak Street and Park Street reference Papers past website Timaru Herald newspaper 06 October 1908 page 4. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded Oak Street.

Park Street [renamed Kowhai Street]

Park Street no longer exists. Park Street is now known as Kowhai Street. Waldegrave Park Estate 1910 Oak, Elm, Hazel, Pine, McParland streets Willow & Poplar grove (plus Park Street which was renamed Kowhai Street). On the 1908 plan of Upper Hutt Township Estate, Park Street was situated around the area of Oxford Park and Oxford Crescent School. The UH history states that Park Street became known as Keys Street but Keys street is in a different area. They have just obtained authority to lay out some new streets and have named them, Willow Grove, Poplar Grove, Hazel Street, Elm Street, Oak Street and Park Street reference Papers past website Timaru Herald newspaper 06 October 1908 page 4

[Kowhai Avenue]

Kowhai Avenue was named after the native tree Kowhai but was originally named Park Street. The Waldegrave Park Estate subdivision's theme was trees perhaps taken from the fact that most of the streets began at Pine Avenue. The 1910 Waldegrave Park Estate plan and correspondence recorded Oak, Elm, Hazel, Pine, McParland streets Willow & Poplar grove plus Park Street which was renamed Kowhai Street). They have just obtained authority to lay out some new streets and have named them, Willow Grove, Poplar Grove, Hazel Street, Elm Street, Oak Street and Park Street (renamed Kowhai Street) reference Papers past website Timaru Herald newspaper 06 October 1908 page 4. News of the Day - Upper Hutt Road - When the Upper Hutt Land Company subdivided original section 120 a street called Park Street was laid out to join with a street similarly named in the Waldegrave Park estate, original section 119. The company was enabled to make connection through to Ebdentown Road on original section 121. Even since the constitution of the borough the Mayor has endeavoured to obtain the consent of intervening owners to carry the road through. Arrangements have now been completed with the Public Trustee, who is administering the estate of the deceased owner of lots 39, 41, 43, 45, and 47, Ebdentown Road, enabling the purchase by the council of the whole of allotment 39 and 7ft

of lot 41 for the construction of a 40ft road in continuation of Park Street, so that through traffic between Ebdentown Road and Pine Avenue will be provided reference Papers past website Evening Post newspaper 30 November 1935 page 8. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 records Kowhai Avenue.

Pine Avenue

Pine Avenue was named after the Sequoia Pine trees that grew in the road. I was information that Pine Avenue was original called Slaughterhouse Road as there were many butchers in the street. George Brown planted all the Pine Trees in the area. Waldegrave Park Estate 02 February 1910 Oak, Elm, Hazel, Pine, McParland streets Willow & Poplar grove (and Park Street is now Kowhai Street). Pine Avenue was already established and the Street was drawn on the 1908 plan of Upper Hutt Township Estate. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded Pine Avenue.

Poplar Grove

Poplar Grove was named after the Poplar tree. The Waldegrave Park Estate subdivision's theme was trees perhaps taken from the fact that most of the streets began at Pine Avenue. The 1910 Waldegrave Park Estate plan and correspondence recorded Oak, Elm, Hazel, Pine, McParland streets Willow & Poplar grove (and Park Street which was renamed Kowhai Street). They have just obtained authority to lay out some new streets and have named them, Willow Grove, Poplar Grove, Hazel Street, Elm Street, Oak Street and Park Street reference Papers past website Timaru Herald newspaper 06 October 1908 page 4. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded Poplar Grove.

Willow Grove

Willow Grove was named after the Willow tree. The Waldegrave Park Estate subdivision's theme was trees perhaps taken from the fact that most of the streets began at Pine Avenue. The 1910 Waldegrave Park Estate plan and correspondence recorded Oak, Elm, Hazel, Pine, McParland streets Willow & Poplar grove (and Park Street which was renamed Kowhai Street). The Authorities of Upper Hutt Township have timber on the brain. They have just obtained authority to lay out some new streets and have named them, Willow Grove, Poplar Grove, Hazel Street, Elm Street, Oak Street and Park Street reference Papers past website Timaru Herald newspaper 06 October 1908 page 4. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded Willow Grove.

Origin of Street names in the 1908 Waldegrave Park Estate extension

Alexandria Street

Alexandria Street no longer exists but was located in the Oxford Park area where the Oxford Crescent School is also situated. In 1915 during World War One Alexandria and Cairo became the main hospital for the soldiers wounded at Gallipoli. Alexandria Street was recorded on the 1908 plan of the "Upper Hutt Township Estate".

Cairo Street

Cairo Street was named after Cairo the Capital of Egypt. In 1915 during World War One Cairo and Alexandria became the main hospital for Gallipoli wounded. Cairo and Alexandria Streets were drawn on a 1908 plan of the "Upper Hutt Township Estate".

Cromwell Street

Cromwell Street no longer exists but was located in the Oxford Park area where Oxford Crescent School is now situated. Cromwell Street was recorded on the 1908 plan of the "Upper Hutt Township Estate".

Exchange Street

Exchange Street was named after the telephone exchange situated in the street. Further research is required to confirm the origin of the name as streets normally developed and named long before any structures are built. Exchange Street was drawn on a 1908 plan of the "Upper Hutt Township Estate." Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1961-1962 recorded Exchange Street.

Hay Street

Hay Street was perhaps named after hay grown and harvested in the area. Hay Street was drawn on a 1908 plan of the "Upper Hutt Township Estate". Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded Hay Street.

Hutt Main Road [now known as Ferguson Drive] = refer 1907 section above

King Street

King Street was named after the King of England. King Street was recorded on the 1908 plan of the "Upper Hutt Township Estate" reference Upper Hutt Reflections from the Past by Joseph M Kenneally 1980 inside front cover. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded King Street. Please note that there was another King Street which no longer exists. It was recorded on an early Dominion Estate subdivision plan and was later renamed Gibbons Street. Two separate early subdivisions recorded two different King Streets on their plans so a decision was made to keep one and rename the other Gibbons Street. Logan Street

Logan Street was named after the Solicitors Logan and Logan who were the legal advisors to Senator Sladden the surveyor who prepared original plans of the area. The Gawith and Logan Solicitors of Masterton had a business at the same time as the business of Seaton & Sladden Engineers. Logan Street was drawn on the 1908 plan of the Upper Hutt Township Estate. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded Logan Street.

McParland Street = refer 1907 subdivision above

Park Street = refer 1907 subdivision above

Pine Avenue = refer 1907 subdivision above

Queen Street

Queen Street was named after the Queen Victoria. Victoria (1819-1901) was the Queen of United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and Empress of India. Queen Street was already established when drawn on the 1908 Plan of Upper Hutt Township Estate. Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 recorded Queen Street.

Rutland Street

Rutland Street no longer exists. Rutland Street was recorded on a 1908 plan of Upper Hutt Township Estate and situated and absorbed into the area around Oxford Park and current Oxford Crescent School.

Sinclair Street

Sinclair Street was named after one of the Sinclair family. Perhaps Alexander Sinclair who was a freehold farmer at Upper Mungaroa on Sections 45, 46, 47 Mungaroa and was recorded on the 1880-1881 Hutt Electoral Roll. Sinclair Street appeared on the 1908 plan of the "Upper Hutt Township Estate". Wises NZ Post Office Directory volume 2 1955 & 1959 & 1961-1962 records Sinclair Street.

Waldegrave Park Estate - Tonight at 7.30 o'clock Messrs Thomson and Brown will submit by public auction at the Chamber of Commerce rooms, Customhouse quay, Waldegrave Park Estate situated opposite the Upper Hutt Railway Station. The estate has been subdivided into 179 residential sections ranging in area from twenty perches upward. Messrs Thomson and Brown claim that it is in this direction that the future growth of the city must be. The auctioneers state that the plans for the Government Railway Maintenance Workshops have been prepared and will be erected adjacent to the Upper Hutt Station. Empty houses in the Upper Hutt are a rarity and it is stated that workmen have been compelled to live at the Lower Hutt owing to this scarcity. The auction sale of the Waldegrave Park Estate will enable those desiring it to secure sections for building. All the streets in the Waldegrave Park Estate are now formed and are 66ft wide. Keen competition is anticipated for all sections tonight. At the request of a large number of Upper Hutt residents Messrs Thomson and Brown have made arrangements with the railway authorities to delay the last train tonight until ten minutes past 10 o'clock. As there are 180 sections to offer for competition, the auctioneers draw special attention to the fact that the conditions of sale will be read at 7.30 sharp.
