In the early days of the Colony the provision of education was left to the churches, to private enterprise or particularly in the Southern settlements to public bodies.

1849

The Reverend Thomas Biddulph Hutton to be Resident Deacon and Inspector of Schools in the district of Wellington.

1852

With the settling up of the Provinces in 1852 the Provincial Councils took over the control of education.

General Legislation Council 22nd December 1852 - In conformity with the terms of the Education Ordinance, Session VIII No 10 Inspectors have been appointed for those schools which are supported by public funds. The reports of those Inspectors in so far as they have been received shall be laid before you from those pots you will find that Industrial Schools established in various parts of New Zealand for the benefit of the Native race have been far more successful than could have been reasonably anticipated and that they will exercise a most important and useful influence upon the future of this country.

1853

Another statistician Mr Josep Fletcher Government Inspector of Schools and Honorary Secretary of the Statistical Society has recently died at the early age of 41.

1850s

A Dame School, established by Mrs Hannah Barton at Trentham was the first place of formal learning in the Upper Hutt Valley. Miss H Hedge was the teacher. (Reference Upper Hutt the history by J A Kelleher 1991 Chapter XIII page 231)

1861

Folk lore tells that there was an attempt to establish a school in the Blockhouse. While others state that a school was established in the blockhouse but only for a short time. The Blockhouse was built in 1860.

Edward PLAYER settled in the Upper Hutt district between 1860 and 1869. His later obituary stated that he was a teacher at Upper Hutt School. Perhaps he was the teacher at the blockhouse. The Player family resided on Section no 125 which was north-east of Ward street and Section no 94 were the blockhouse was built in 1860. 1264

Upper Hutt School was established in 1864. The school occupied St Joseph's Church for around 4 years before a new school was built in either 1866 or 1868.

1865

Wellington Independent newspaper 23 February 1865

Appointment of School Inspector – Provincial Secretary Office Wellington 09th February 1865 His honour the Superintendent has been please to appoint – AW F Halcombe Esq., JP to be Inspector of School for the Province. The appointment to date from the 01st instant. J Woodward Acting Provincial Secretary.

1866 or 1868

Upper Hutt School moved to new premises next to the former Rose of Sharon Lodge on the road (Fergusson Drive) between Whakatiki Street and Moonshine Road.

1876

Mungaroa School was established on the site that is now occupied by the Benge Memorial Hall.

1877

Their [Provinces] abolition in 1876 opened the way to the founding of the present national system of free secular and compulsory education through the Education Act 1877.

Education Act 1877 gave control over primary education to regional Education Boards. (Reference Family History at National Archives published 1990 page 63)

1882

Whiteman's Valley School was established in 1882 on the corner of Blue Mountains Road and Johnson's Road in Whiteman's Valley.

1884

Kaitoke School was established in the Pakuratahi / Kaitoke region.

1885

Wallaceville School also spelt Wallace School was established and situated on Whiteman's alley Road. The school was near the intersection of Wallaceville Road and Maymorn Road in the Mangaroa Valley.

1885

At Archives New Zealand Wellington School schedules are held for the Wellington Education Board from 1885 to 1909.

1886

The Act provided for the establishment of a central Department of Education under the control of a Cabinet Minister, Secretary, Inspector General (combined with the office of Secretary in 1886) and a small staff of officers and clerks. Control of the school system was left in the hands of twelve District Education Boards. The Hutt valley came under the Wellington Education Board. 1890s

Akatarawa School was established in the Akatarawa Valley for the children of the sawmilling companies in the valley.

1906

In 1906 the Wellington Teachers college reopened

1907 the School journal was first issued.

St Joseph's Industrial School was established between Pine Avenue and Royal Street. The entrance was on Pine Avenue. St Joseph's Industrial School was also an orphanage.

1912

Karapoti School was established on Akatarawa Road near the turnoff to the Karapoti Valley.

1913

Mungaroa School was renamed Te Marua School but remained on the same site which is now occupied by the Benge Memorial Hall. The hall was once the Mungaroa School building.

1914

Mangaroa School was established as a private school in Maclaren Road in Mangaroa Valley by Mrs Seed.

1919

1919 the dental service was established then later transferred to the Health Department.

Mangaroa School was transferred to a new building site on Flux Road.

1921

1921 the Education Gazette was instituted.

1922 Intermediate school began.

1924

Silverstream School was established in Whiteman's Valley Road Silverstream. The school now occupies the corner of Whiteman's Road and Gard Street in Silverstream.

1926

Trentham School was established on the corner of Moonshine Road and Fergusson Drive.

1928

Education Department regulations in 1928 stated that registers of admission and attendance were to be kept by each school until their destruction was authorised by the Minister. (Reference Family History at National Archives published 1990 page 65)

1931

St Patrick's College was established on the Main Hutt Road (renamed Fergusson Drive) in Silverstream.

1938

Hukinga School was established in the sawmilling site in the Karapoti Valley off Akatarawa Road.

1951

Maymorn School was established off Parks Line Road in the Mangaroa / Maymorn Valley.

1952

Oxford Crescent School was established on Oxford Crescent in central Upper Hutt.

1954

Pinehaven School was established on Pinehaven Road with access off Forest Road in Pinehaven.

Heretaunga College was established in 1954 on Ward Street in the Wallaceville / Trentham district.

1955

Brentwood School was established with access off Brentwood Street and backed onto the Trentham Memorial Park.

1956

Fraser Crescent School was established with access to the school from Redwood Street.

1957

Te Marua School which once occupied the Benge Memorial Hall was transferred to a new building site down the road towards the Brown Owl district.

1961

St Brendan's School was established on the corner of Sutherland Avenue and Palmer Crescent.

1962

Upper Hutt College was established with the entrance off Moonshine Road.

1966

Fergusson Intermediate was established with the entrance off Hikurangi Street.

1968

Plateau School was established with the entrance off Molloys Road in Te Marua.

1969

Maoribank School was established with the entrance off Hillside Drive.

1970

Maidstone Intermediate was established with entrance off Redwood Street.

1973

Te Marua School was renamed Brown Owl School as it was situated in the Brown Owl district.

1977

Totara Park School was established with entrance off California Drive in Totara Park district.

1978

Birchville School was established with entrance off Gemstone Drive

1989

1989 Education Boards abolished (about 12/13 boards.

1991

Hutt Independent Boys School was established with the entrance off Field Street in Silverstream.

1994

Hutt International Boys School once known as Hutt Independent Boys School opened on a new site off Granville Street near the Trentham Racecourse.

2000s

Silverstream Christian School was established with the entrance off Blue Mountain's Road.

2021

Maoribank School was renamed Te Kura o Hau Karetu in 2021.

RULES FOR FEMALE TEACHERS 1915

- 1. You will NOT marry during the term of your contract
- 2. You are NOT to keep company with men
- You MUST be home between the hours of 8 pm and 6 am unless attending a school function
- 4. You MAY NOT travel beyond the city limits without the permission of the chairman of the board
- 5. You MAY NOT loiter downtown in ice-cream stores
- 6. You MAY NOT ride in a carriage or automobile with any man unless he is your father or brother
- 7. You MAY NOT smoke cigarettes
- 8. You MAY NOT dress in bright colours
- 9. You may UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES dye your hair
- 10. You must wear AT LEAST two petticoats
- 11. Your dress must NOT be any shorter than two inches above the ankle
- 12. To keep the school room clean you must
 - a. sweep the floor at least once daily
 - b. scrub the floor with hot soapy water at least once a week
 - c. clean the blackboard at least once a day
 - d. start the fire at 7 am so that the room will be warm by 8 am

RULES FOR TEACHERS 1872

- 1. Teachers each day will fill lamps, clean chimneys
- 2. Each teacher will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the day's session
- 3. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of the pupils
- 4. Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly
- 5. After ten hours in school, the teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
- 6. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
- 7. Every teacher should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.
- 8. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, intention, integrity and honesty.
- 9. The teacher who performs his labour faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay, providing the Board of Education approves.
